

When Jesus was born very few people celebrated His birth. Among those few who celebrated His birth were the Shepherds. The way the shepherds celebrated the birth of Jesus Christ reveals to us the pattern of our Christian life — in other words, it reveals the way we are called to live our Christian life. Here is the pattern of our Christian life revealed to us by the Shepherds:

First, the Shepherds **HEAR** the Good News – "the Saviour of the world has been born... **GO** and see Him..."

Second, In obedience they **GO** to the stable to **SEE** the Saviour.

Third, They **TELL** everyone around them about the Saviour.

This is the pattern of our Christian life. We **hear** about Jesus; then we come to meet and know Him; and then We cannot help it, but share this encounter with the world. Hear the Word, Adore the Lord, Tell the world.


Just like the Shepherds, may you also pray for the courage and opportunity this Christmas season to tell someone else, very simply, what Jesus means to you.



GIFTS

Gifts are everywhere at this time of year. Christmas gifts. Hostess gifts. Hidden gifts. Wrong-size gifts. Unexpected gifts. Unwanted gifts. Unreciprocated gifts. And in to-day's readings we hear about even more gifts: gold, frankincense, and myrrh. But we know intuitively (or, one hopes, eventually!) that gifts are symbols of something much deeper and less tangible. The gift of God's Son is, of course, at the heart of our Christmas festivities. We are not—and never—alone, because "God is with us." (Thus the name Emmanuel.) But wait, that's not all! The liturgy reminds us over and over that this is a "holy exchange." As Christ came to share in our humanity, we come to share in his divinity. The full significance of that mystery is a gift we have yet to unwrap completely.

WHAT KIND OF GOD IS THIS?

Christmas is a season of abundance. Christmas cookies and carols. Parties and presents. Mangers and mistletoe. The same is true in our church. Within a period of nine days we celebrate Christmas, the Holy Family, Mary Mother of God, and today the Solemnity of the Epiphany. Truly an embarrassment of liturgical riches. (And we are not finished yet!)

However, for many people, Christmas is already over. Trees litter the curbside or make their way back to the attic. Presents are put away or returned. We prepare to go back to school or work. But as Christians we have barely dipped our toes into the profound mystery of a God who walks among us. What kind of a God is this whose kingdom is not limited by our borders, fears, expectations, or imaginations? Today's psalm reminds us, "Lord, every nation on earth will adore you." Diversity and inclusion are not new to God's agenda.

TRADITIONS UNCOVER MEANING

Two traditional rituals, one liturgical and one domestic, help underline the meaning of the Epiphany. The Proclamation of the Date of Easter is an option for inclusion at Mass today. This text which formally announces the dates of the upcoming major feast days reminds us that Christmas is best honored in the context of the whole story of salvation that culminates in Easter. Or as writer Nathan Mitchell reflects, the wood of the crib becomes the wood of the cross.

The second tradition connected to Epiphany is the blessing of the door of one's home with chalk. It includes a prayer for protection for all who enter therein. One explanation of this tradition ties it to the Passover in the Book of Exodus: the marking of

the doorposts with the blood of the lamb kept the Israelites safe. This tradition too offers a connection between Christmas and Easter.

As we continue to mine the richness of this season we hum along with the angels. Gloria in excelsis Deo!



The primary role of the Master of Ceremonies (MC) is to assist in organizing the Mass and directing all liturgical movement so it flows with the proper decorum. This is a vibrant, exciting and rewarding ministry. MC's commit to a minimum of one weekend Mass per month and an occasional meeting or weeknight Mass for special celebrations or feast days. MC's are required to have organizational skills, be able to give and take directions and work well with children (Altar Servers).

In our parish the Master of Ceremonies is responsible for the proper and smooth conduct of the various liturgical ceremonies such as the Solemn Mass, Triduum observances etc.

St. Joseph, Patron of the Universal Church

Who was Joseph in the life of Jesus?

In Luke 1:26-27, after establishing the time ("in the sixth month") and space ("a town of Galilee called Nazareth") for his "historical" account about the circumstances of the conception and birth of Jesus, Luke turns now to the socio-anthropological dimension: a young unmarried Mary, in contrast to the old married Elizabeth, is betrothed to a man named Joseph. Betrothal was a mutual agreement of parents; but the betrothed did not live together while mutually observing their fidelity and love for each other. Linking Joseph to David finalizes the identity of Jesus as the only Messiah and there is no other. Joseph, the poor of Nazareth, is the link of Jesus, the Messiah, to the royal Davidic line.

In Luke 2:1-7 again Luke sets up the "historical" circumstances surrounding the birth of Jesus: "In those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus (Roman emperor) that the whole world should be enrolled...when Quirinius was governor of Syria" (by whom Israel as a Roman colony was ruled through its local puppet and despot). The census or enrollment of the population of the empire was the State's tool to determine who could be soldiers of its military force, workers of its farms and factories and how much tribute or taxes could be levied from each to support the ruling families. This royal decree from the center of power is in contrast to that obscure town of Nazareth in Galilee (the hideout of the resistance movement against Roman rule and its local despotic puppet) and now powerless Bethlehem (*Beth* = house, *lehem* = bread, hence: Bethlehem = House of Bread) a tiny city of David in the old glorious but bygone days of the Davidic dynasty. Joseph's quiet compliance to the oppressive State turns into a silent obedient commitment of an ordinary man to the vulnerable pregnant Mary and homeless powerless Jesus. Luke is serving notice of the birth of Jesus as the advent of the sign of contradiction and conflictivity. Joseph provides the link to this sign of contradiction and conflictivity by his quiet compliance to earthly power on the one hand, and silent obedience to the will of God, on the other. Joseph makes the silent encounter between the mystery of Jesus' liberating alternative Kingdom of God and the oppressive unjust Kingdom of Power on earth happen.

In Luke 2:16-20 we find the poor, lowly and humble ambience of the manger as the privileged space for the emergence of a spectacular message from heaven. As Mary ponders the message of the shepherds in her heart, Joseph rises as the silent keeper of this dramatic spectacle of Messiaship and Lordship connected to the Davidic lineage ("For today in the city of David a savior has been born for you who is Messiah and Lord ... wrapped in swaddling clothes ... (Luke 2:11-12) through him.

In Luke 2:41-52 Joseph watches in silence as Jesus claims God's divine paternity for himself and that he would be after the affairs of his Father. And yet, after finding Jesus in the Temple, Joseph will bring Jesus home. There he becomes the silent teacher of Jesus in matters of faith and trade, of life's principles and carpentry, of wisdom and practicality. If Jesus later in his life becomes teacher – the Only Teacher of life and faith – he has learned the trade of creativity and preaching from the heart from Joseph. Joseph is the silent profound wise teacher by word and example of Jesus.

In Luke 3:23-38, we find the genealogy of Jesus from Luke's special source, a tradition about the lineage of Jesus which is different from the Matthean genealogy. Luke's genealogy begins with Jesus as the son, as was thought, of Joseph and ends with Adam, the son of God. This makes Jesus a member of the universal humanity, and not just an exclusive possession of the Jewish nation (Matthew's tradition). The belongingness of Jesus to the human family is made possible by attaching him to Joseph. That makes Joseph the silent guardian of the mystery of the Incarnation of Jesus.

Joseph the worker, the carpenter – Matt. 13:55, Mark 6:3, Luke 4:22; John 6:42 – and the father, as thought of, of Jesus. Identifying Jesus to Joseph and his trade has made Jesus and his words and deeds unacceptable to the people. Because he "originated" from Joseph, an ordinary man,



a simple carpenter. Because Jesus' mentor was a silent insignificant worker. This experience of unacceptability and rejection has become an invitation to prophetic solidarity with the poor, the workers, the rejected and marginalized at the periphery of society. It is to these people, the poor, the sinner, the outcast, the lawless, that Jesus would identify himself with. Joseph is Jesus' silent teacher to a quiet persistent solidarity with the silenced poor of a silent Yahweh.

In Luke's Gospel, Joseph with his Silence is the Quiet Protector of the Silence of God.
